Westfield White Trackers -


The Westfield White Trackers were one of the pioneer clubs in the county. They were first organized in 1967 and are currently the largest group of the six chapters with about 175 members. They have built and maintained some 75 miles of trails over the years and in addition to connecting with other clubs they also hook up with trails belonging to Coloma and Wautoma groups. The White Trackers are a very active bunch. They hold an annual Landowners Appreciation Day, a kiddies Christmas party, and inter-club races. They also give training courses on snowmobile safety for the youngsters and assist the Sheriff's Department when necessary. 
Montello Yetis –

The Montello Yetis are perhaps the most centrally located of all the groups in Marquette County. 'Yetis', by the way, is another word for the legendary abominable snowman of Tibet. The club first came to life in 1967 and now has about 150 members. This year they estimate to have between 60 and 70 miles of club trails and join the Kingston club trails in Green Lake County. Some of the special activities of this group are cook-outs, a land owners appreciation dinner and races for club members. In the summer they also sponsor grass drag races sanctioned by the SWSRA. Neshkoro White River E-Z Riders -

The third club to become a part of the Marquette County Snowmobile Association was the White River E-Z Riders. They banded together in 1969 and are located in the Neshkoro area. Some 80 members take care of approximately 60 miles of trails. In addition to their home county the E-Z Riders have ways of getting to Wautoma, Redgranite, Berlin and Princeton. To show their gratitude to persons who allow the club to put trails through their property, the club puts an a picnic in the summer. Winter cook-outs are also a favorite of this group. Ever since its inception several years ago, the Marquette Coun-Ever since its inception several years ago, the marquette Coun-ty snowmobile Association has grown at a rapid rate. Today the association has six chapters (see below) with approximately 700 members. These enthusiastic snowmobilers have built and currently maintain about 300 miles of marked private trails in all parts of the county. These trails are interconnecting and make it posof the county. These trails are interconnecting and make it possible for snowmobile drivers to go almost anywhere in the county, and most trails connect with the trails of adjoining counties so that connecting trails totalling literally thousands of miles are available to drivers. A reciprocal agreement permits local folks to use the trails of other clubs outside the county. As stated, all of these trails are private, and any non-member using them is subject to a trespasing charge. But memberships in the clubs are cheap and readily available.
